## The Five Early Literacy Practices

 **Talking**

**Talking** helps children learn oral language and self-expression that is critical to brain development.

 **Singing**

**Singing** and rhyming increases sensitivity to words and sounds, helping children decode print.

 **Reading**

**Reading** together helps children with every literacy skill. It is the single best way to help them get ready to read.

 **Writing**

**Writing** helps children learn that letters and words stand for sounds and that print has meaning.

 **Playing**

**Playing** helps children learn about the world. It also helps children understand stories once they start to read.
